## YEAR 13 BIOLOGY

On June 12th - 14th the Yr. 13 Biology classes spent three days working on their 3.1 Biology Practical investigation at the University of Otago Marine Science centre in Portobello. They had the expertise of a teaching fellow and two Masters Students from Marine Sciences. They spent the first day studying half crabs and investigation their Niche on the rocky shore, as well as deciding on the focus of their investigation. The next two days were quite intensive while they carried out the investigation and collected data on the half crab's response. The advantage of using the Marine Science centre is the expertise we get from the university and the resources available to carry out university level investigations.



As part of the Science Festival in Dunedin, the University Alumni Association sponsored a lunch on Friday June 24th with the focus on Science in Sport. In attendance from King's were Mrs. Jopson, Jake Burtenshaw (below left), Jordan Ward (below right) and Tame Govaerts. The guest speaker was Sir Graham Henry who spoke about the All Blacks and the progression over the years to incorporate up-to-date scientific research to improve their performance - from nutrition, to training to psychology.
